


„Diese neue Übersetzung führt die Fachkompetenzen eines Theologen und eines Klassischen Philologen zusammen und eröffnet damit eine neue Perspektive auf die Offenbarung des Johannes jenseits kirchlich-konfessioneller Hörgewohnheiten.“

Der Text der Johannesapokalypse wird in zwei Fassungen geboten: Während die Lesefassung die

Übersetzung als Fließtext ohne Unterbrechung durch die Vers- und Kapiteleinteilungen präsentiert, bietet die Studienfassung die Zählungen der Verse und Kapitel, um so einen Vergleich mit dem Original und anderen Übersetzungen zu ermöglichen. Die Abfolge beider Fassungen macht nicht allein die ästhetische und theologische Sprachkraft dieses hochberühmten letzten Buches der Bibel auf ungewohnte Weise lesbar, sondern führt zu zahlreichen überraschenden Erkenntnissen über die sprachliche Gestaltung und den Sinngehalt dieses äußerst komplexen Textes. Der Übersetzung beigegeben sind eine Einführung mit Erläuterung der Übersetzungsprinzipien, ein Epilog, in dem zentrale Interpretationsansätze vorgeführt werden und ein Glossar mit den markantesten semantischen Entscheidungen, das sich nicht an späteren kirchlichen Traditionen, sondern am Koine-Griechisch des 1. Jh. n. Chr. orientiert.“

IHAB SALOUL, JAN WILLEM VAN HENTEN (EDS): Martyrdom. Canonisation, Contestation and Afterlives. Amsterdam: Amsterdam University Press 2020.



“The phenomenon of martyrdom is more than 2000 years old but, as contemporary events show, still very much alive. Martyrdom: Canonisation, Contestation

and Afterlives examines the canonisation, contestation and afterlives of martyrdom and connects these with cross-cultural acts and practices of remembrance. Martyrdom appeals to the imagination of many because it is a highly ambiguous spectacle with thrilling deadly consequences. Imagination is thus a vital catalyst for martyrdom, for martyrs become martyrs only because others remember and honour them as such. This memorialisation occurs through rituals and documents that incorporate and re-interpret traditions deriving from canonical texts. The canonisation of martyrdom generally occurs in one of two ways: First, through ritual commemoration by communities of inside readers, listeners, viewers and participants, who create and recycle texts, re-interpreting them until the martyrs ultimately receive a canonical status, or second, through commemoration as a means of contestation by competing communities who perceive these same people as traitors or terrorists. By adopting

an interdisciplinary orientation and a cross-cultural approach, this book goes beyond both the insider admiration of martyrs and the partisan rejection of martyrdoms and concisely synthesises key interpretive questions and themes that broach the canonised,


unstable and contested representations of martyrdom as well as their analytical connections, divergences and afterlives in the present."

Petrus ist eine zentrale Gestalt des werdenden Christentums. Sie hat einen bedeutenden Zweig der

Literatur geprägt, und es gibt schon früh eine ebenso bedeutende Lokaltradition in Rom. Allerdings interagiert das eine mit dem anderen nur punktuell und erstaunlich spät. Der vorliegende Band leuchtet den differenzierten Befund aus neutestamentlicher und kirchenhistorischer Sicht aus. Die Beiträge behandeln die frühe Petrusliteratur innerhalb und außerhalb des Neuen Testaments sowie die archäologische und kirchliche Petrustradition in Rom, wie sie seit dem zweiten Jahrhundert bezeugt ist. Die Frage nach der besonderen Stellung des Bischofs von Rom ist dabei nicht explizit Gegenstand, steht aber im Hintergrund der Untersuchung.
